Cardin visited the Joppatowne High School Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness Magnet Program on Friday, October 24th, to learn about the nation's first comprehensive program devoted to training high school students for careers in homeland security and emergency preparedness. The Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC) process has recommended that more than 8,000 new jobs move to Harford County's Aberdeen Proving Ground by 2011. - Intent to Name Schucks Road Elementary Announced - According to Board policy, the official announcement of the intent to name the elementary school that is being constructed off Schucks Road, near Churchville, was made at the Board meeting held Monday, September 22. The policy suggests that the name of a public school facility should "give proper recognition to the community which it serves," but also provides for a building/ground to be named for a person, living or dead, who has made "significant contributions to education in the Harford County Public Schools." The policy further requires the intent to name be widely publicized in the community, with an invitation for the public to submit names in writing or in person during Board meetings in the 60-day interim, between announcing the intent to name and action being taken. The Superintendent will provide the Board with a complete list of names suggested along with her recommendation at the Monday, November 24th Board meeting. Allowing for 60-days required prior to naming the building, the Board will take action at its December 8, 2008 business meeting (7:00 p.m., HCPS A.A. Roberty Building).
