




### HCPS Enrollment & Chronic Absenteeism (K-12)





#### Elementary School Enrollment & Chronic Absenteeism






#### Middle School Enrollment & Chronic Absenteeism






### High School Enrollment & Chronic Absenteeism

#### **Underlying Barriers**

- No alarm clock
- Taking care of younger siblings
- Food insecurity
- Access to laundry
- Other priorities
- Substance abuse
- Access to technology
- Missed bus
- Long walk to school/no bus
- Chronic illness

- Language barriers
- Academic issues

AND


Removing barriers to attendance


### Increasing FARMS Population





### Title I/Community Schools – Chronic Absenteeism

#### % of Students Chronically Absent by School Year





#### Community Schools

- Addition of Community Schools Specialists
- Full time Pupil Personnel Workers (PPW)
- Social Workers
- Funds for incentives
- Increased partnerships to help address absenteeism
- More staff to devote time to attendance concerns
- Able to conduct more home visits
- Provide resources (clothing, food, hygiene products, etc.)
- Education to parents about impact of absenteeism
- Care Teams
- Incentives and celebrations




#### Pupil Services 24-25 Focus

- Pilot New Attendance Procedures in 6 schools
  - Shift school-based interventions to prevent the 18<sup>th</sup> absence
  - Implement main office emails to parents after absences 5, 10, and 15
  - Distribute Parent Acknowledgment of Attendance Rules
  - Shift PPW interventions to address chronic absence
  - Apply consequences to chronically absent students
- Restructure legal (court) referral criteria
  - Truancy without educational services for interventions in Truancy Court
  - Negative educational impact for criminal prosecution in District Court



#### SY 2024-25 Secondary Approach

• Implemented Cell Phone Policy revision

• Increased number of PBIS schools, including all middle schools

Increased Swan Creek options for families

Piloted Twilight program at multiple schools to reduce suspensions

Increased Social Worker and Behavior Coach positions in high needs schools



### SY 2024-25 Elementary Approach

- **Pre K-2 Workgroup** Assistant Principals and Principals working collaboratively with Student Services to address the unique needs of this population.
- 2024-25 Expanded use of TeachTown in Kindergarten Daily behavioral lessons in Kindergarten district-wide.
- Elementary Retraining of HCPS SST Process Enhanced SST Process to include Behavioral Support Progressions Chart and Elementary Tiered Levels of Supports and Interventions
- **Revised PreK-2 Suspension Process** Retrained administrators on revisions to the process and included a consult with Ed Services prior to suspension.
- In District Non-Pub Classroom at Swan Creek seats for elementary and middle school students working with Highroads. Can serve as an interim placement for students needing a non-public placement.
- Targeted Professional Development at Select Schools targeted, school-based, PD provided by Behavior Coaches, BCBA, and SE Coordinator of Training and Technical Assistance.
